Retired from a career with Canadian National Railway, Dougherty now leads exercise sessions for older adults as a VON volunteer with Canadian National Railway donating \$15 for each hour Dougherty volunteers, up to a maximum of \$2,500. "Dave's dedication was undeniable as he presented VON SMART with the full \$2,500 for his hours of service," Gee stated, adding Dougherty has invigorated the lives of older adults who look forward to his visits at retirement homes and condos.

At last, Spring has arrived and it feels like a good time for a road trip.

Maybe a drive to Marmora would be fun. Last time there (more than a few years ago), the Marmora slag heaps were still visible and east of town you could stop and view the big (I mean really big) hole that used to be the site of the Marmoraton Mine.

Here's what the <u>marmoraandlake.ca</u> website says about that hole: "In 1953, engineers had to blast through 120 feet of limestone before reaching highgrade ore. The open-pit mine measures approximately 1700 feet by 1200 feet and reached 600 feet deep."

Why dig a hole there? Here's the answer from marmorahistory.ca: "Four years before the defeat of Germany in World War Two, the Canadian Government joined with the American-based Bethlehem Steel Corporation to finally take an interest in the mineral riches of the Marmora region in Hastings County. Due to the large amount of tonnage lost at sea through German submarines and the fact that iron was necessary for the manufacture of war weapons, they joined forces in an endeavour to combine and upgrade technical knowledge and finance the search for iron deposits. At the peak of production the Marmoraton Mine yielded half a million tons of rich pelletized iron and the final depth of the open pit reached seven hundred and fifty feet. On June 29, 1973 the Belleville Intelligencer published an article stating the Marmoraton is the biggest hole in Hastings County and also the richest."

More from the marmoraandlake.ca website;

"The mine employed some 300 men who worked to fill the 30 to 35 railway cars, daily, for transport south to Picton port where it was loaded into boats. The mine produced 520,000 tons of pellets annually. When the mine closed in 1979, it had mined almost 1.3 million tons of iron ore. Over time, underground streams and rainfall slowly filled the mine with water. So much so, that it is now officially classified as a lake."

After visiting Marmora, maybe drive over to the county and visit Picton.

More from marmorahistory.ca:

"In the second year of operation, Directors of the steel company, in conjunction with the Canadian Government, decided to build a special dock at Picton Bay, an arm of the Bay of Quinte on Lake Ontario. Picton was chosen because of its strategic location and close proximity to a readily available employment pool from Prince Edward County. It was necessary for the dock to stretch twelve hundred feet into deep water so it could accommodate the largest lake vessels of the day. The dock also had to be strong enough to hold ore-storage bins with a capacity for many tons of weight when pellet loaded rail cars disgorged their precious burden. After the dock was completed carriers of every description were crossing Lake Ontario on regular runs. They docked at Lackawanna, New York, unloaded the ore and returned to Picton to load again."

Home again, Home again. That's a full day road trip.

The ORE TRAIN used to do that road (rail) trip daily, five days a week.

Working as an Operator at Belleville, and copying train orders I remember thinking, "this is an awfully complicated set of instructions for a relatively simple task."

First a train order to run extra to Marmora. With this authority he could leave Belleville, Westward on the Campbellford Subdivision a distance of 19.8 miles, passing Foxboro, Madoc Jct, and Stirling to Anson (because Anson was listed as a register station the Conductor was required to record his presence to show that his train had arrived, or to prove his existence, or to mark his territory, or remind himself on the return trip that he had already, in fact, been there). Leaving Anson he would travel Northward on the Marmora Subdivision a distance of 5 miles, passing Bonarlaw before arriving at Marmora.

When work at Marmora was completed another train order authorized the train to run Southward, **BUT**, the train order made it very clear that it could not leave Marmora until after it had arrived. Working as a Dispatcher at Belleville, I was very cognizant of this because, apparently, the Rule Instructors who audited the Train Order Books were convinced that, theoretically, the crew on the ore train had the capability to run into themselves head on if the train orders did not prevent it. And even though the Operator at Belleville delivered all their train orders to the Extra West at Belleville, this particular order was addressed to the Extra South at Marmora care of the Extra West at Belleville. A "Do not open before Christmas" type of thing is my guess. Or a Rule Instructor thing.

Another train order provided authority to "Work Extra" on the Southern portion of the Marmora Sub. This basically let them operate Southward from Anson a distance of 50 miles, passing Frankford, Trenton, Trenton Yard and Wellington to Picton and back to Trenton without any concern regarding conflicting movements.

After a full days work had been completed and back at Trenton, signal indication provided authority Eastward on the Kingston Subdivision a distance of 12.1 miles to return home to Belleville.

Disclaimer.....I try not to let too many facts get in the way of my stories. Sometimes, I disremember things, but, I can convince myself I know the truth. JWM

p.s... In Toronto at 277 Front St W many years later (mid 1990's?) working as a Rail Traffic Controller, I received a phone call from the local Track Supervisor asking for authority on the Marmora Sub between Trenton and Picton. Since there had been no activity on the Marmora Sub for a long time, I was curious. I asked if he was inspecting the track in advance of renewed rail activity. No, quite the opposite. He was chaperoning a steel buyer from Montreal who wanted to see the condition of the rails before placing his bid.

Canada Dental Care Plan

By mid 2024 most Canadians over 65 may be eligible to receive treatment and coverage under the plan. You need to review the provisions, eligibility, timing and how and when to apply. You should receive a government letter when you are age eligible.

When you receive the letter:

.Follow the instructions in the letter to apply by phone. .Wait to receive confirmation from Service Canada that your application was successful and you qualify for the Canada Dental Care Plan. .Wait to receive your welcome package from Sun Life before scheduling any dental appointments. It will explain when you can start to get dental care paid for and how.
